National news:

Age discrimination is an AAUW's policy priority. National is partnering with the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights on age-related advocacy. Current age discrimination laws are too "short and broad" to be effective according to Dan Kohrman, AARP. They require a higher burden of proof than other discrimination laws and there are fewer avenues for compensation. Right now, the best age discrimination laws come from a few states.

State News

WA state discrimination laws often leave out age as a discrimination class. Adding age to all discrimination statutes was one of the recommendations from the Civil Rights Leadership webinar that national invite AAUW state public policy chairs to attend. We'll talk more about age discrimination laws at our state leadership conference public policy session on August 5th. Please sign up to join us!

Local election concerns dominated our public policy meeting conversations this month. Our state policy team reviewed a draft proclamation/position statement "AAUW-WA proclamation supporting public school educators, academic freedom and equity efforts in schools" that will be presented to the AAUW-WA Board for discussion. We hope this type of document can be used by branches to create talking points and support local advocacy efforts and conversations.

Federal legislators are "home" August 8 through September 5th. This is a great time to meet with them.

Covid Couldn't Keep Us Down!

As I write this article (July 9), campers are lining up to check in to Camp Dunbar, the first of two weeks of Tech Trek at Pacific Lutheran University. As you read this (July 15), Dunbar campers are headed home from a fantastic week of all things STEM and Camp McClintock campers will be arriving Sunday, July 16! COVID 19 still had an impact on the 2023 camps — the vaccination requirement was still a sticking point with many families which precluded some qualified candidates from attending camp. COVID also hit our Dunbar staff, striking down a dorm leader and a teacher. With experience from the pandemic, our teacher was able to teach via Zoom (with in classroom support from Curriculum Coordinator Jennifer Dalziel) until she recovered. And Assistant Director Sue Reichart stepped in to cover the dorm leader role.

Between the two weeks of camp in July at Pacific Lutheran University, we will serve 96 campers from 16 branches. Our former campers, now in their early 20's, continue to be a big support to the program: volunteering themselves in every role available (camp director, assistant director, health aide, dorm leader, student counselor) and bringing college friends and roommates into the program. Special thanks to our two camp directors, Florence Young (Dunbar) and Krislyn Davis (McClintock). It's great to have such outstanding leadership.

Our work isn't over when the campers go back home. We get to shift our focus to the committee work of improving camp operations and strengthening the community of Tech Trek advocates which includes branch members and coordinators, donors from our communities, and our Tech Trek alumni! Indigenous women are murdered at rates 10 times the national average in some jurisdictions, according to a recent federal survey cited by the Attorney General's Office. Washington state has the second-highest number of missing Indigenous people in the United States. Indigenous women and people go missing more than four times more than white women, according to research conducted by the Urban Indian Health Institute in Seattle.
