
I briefly talked about screen-sharing and the Zoom annotation tools. If you want a more in-depth how-to on these, email me.

Public Policy

The 2024 Legislative Session is a short session (2-months) and starts **January** 8th.

AAUW-WA Lobby day (virtual) is **January 22, 2024** followed by Lobby Week January 22– January 26

<u>Click HERE</u> to find Lobby Day updates on our AAUW-WA website. Remember, our website is a great resource for Public Policy updates and links to key resources.

Our Public Policy team will have an agenda for Lobby Day presentations by December 1st, though we won't have a list of Lobby Day bills until later. New bills can't be introduced until 30 days before the session starts.

Washington state has a two-year process (like Congress), so any bill introduced in 2023 that didn't pass, automatically gets rolled over to 2024 with the same bill number and goes back to the house of origin where it was first introduced.

The Public Policy team is busy reviewing 2023 bills (there are a lot of good bills that didn't pass) and reaching out to key legislators to learn what new bills they plan to introduce. We are also learning a lot from legislative committee work sessions. These sessions often provide an update on legislation that passed and/or cover an issue where new legislation is anticipated. For example, the House Education committee work session in December will review the *School Safety and Student Well-Being Advisory Committee* report. We are reviewing several bills on this issue as possible lobby day bills. The Senate Early education and K-12 committee work session included an overview of *artificial Intelligence*, *media literacy*, *misinformation*, *disinformation*. There are bills on this issue we are also reviewing.

The Public Policy committee is meeting weekly now - Tuesdays at noon (see event calendar for the Zoom link). We are also meeting on the 2nd Wednesday of the month in the evening at 6:30 pm for those who can't make the Tuesday meetings.

Advocating for gender equity includes electing policymakers who support gender equity. AAUW national is putting together a 2024 Voter Education Toolkit. **Below are some additional helpful resources:**

The Unprecedented Book Banning Movement and Why We Need to Get Involved

AAUW-Wa Online Branch Program December 6, 2023, 5:30 pm

Come and participate in this thought-provoking discussion of the history, strategies and threats posed by the 21st century book banning movement. Key areas of exploration will include the historical context of book banning movements in the United States, the status of book banning and educational reform initiatives, the evolving politicization of these issues, and what you can do about it.

Scope of the problem: Between January 1 and August 31, 2023, the American Library Association (ALA) reported 695 attempts to censor library materials and services and documented challenges to 1,915 unique titles. This marks a significant 20% increase over the record setting year of 2022. A substantial portion of these banned books are either written by or centered around members of the LGBTQIA+ community and people of color.

Our distinguished panelists on the front line of this conflict over books are:

 Kimberly (John) Cassetto – Walla Walla High School, Library Media Specialist. Kimberly has been awarded the Walla Walla Chamber of

- Commerce 2023 Educator of the Year award, a district Staff Achievement Award, and recognition from WA Secretary of State Steve Hobbs.
- Gavin Downing Kentridge High School, Teacher-Librarian. As a school librarian, he was the proud recipient of the Candace Morgan Intellectual Freedom award in 2022 for his fight against book bans. For his work in equity in education, he won the Student Involvement Award from Washington Education Association in 2023.
- Ava Kirtley Former Student at Walla Walla High School, currently a
 University Student. As a high school Junior, unwilling to let a group of
 people who wanted to ban certain library books go unchallenged, Ava
 established a Banned Book Club and activated her community to get
 involved.

Public Safety

On Saturday October 14 Virginia King, MJ Garlick and Joan Cronk attended a program at Christ Lutheran Church in Federal Way hosted by the Federal Way branch of AAUW, on the topic of *Personal Safety*.

Guest speaker *Tonya Seaberry, Des Moines Community Police Officer*, gave an informative, entertaining and inclusive talk about personal safety. With topics like, "What Does Personal Safety Mean, Knowing Your Surroundings and Being Aware of Them", there was no shortage of valuable information and time for questions from the audience.

"The world isn't as safe as I would like it to be," Seaberry said. She encouraged everyone who finds themselves in a tight spot to be assertive. "Your voice is your best defense," she said, adding in the reminder to ask ourselves, "What am I capable and able of doing?" Shouting "Get back! You are too close" and "I am

not interested," are good tools. She reminded the group to use our competent voice - not our mommy voice.

Setting boundaries and checking nearby exits are also important tools. "Your goal is not to be in a life or death choice. It is okay to be rude" she stressed. She said women should always scan who is around and be alert and aware of surroundings.

Most women have much larger purses than they need, and with them slung over their shoulder or in a grocery cart they could end up as a target, she explained, adding that our phones are really an important lifeline.

There was no shortage of good advice and the interaction with guests and questions and answers in the presentation left us all feeling better informed and hopefully a little safer.
