# **President's Message**

I was telling my husband that I was thinking about what to write in this newsletter. He suggested, dryly, that AAUW ought to have Taylor Swift

join and all or some of the Swifties might join too! Then, I talked with my daughter who is a big Swiftie fan, about AAUW. She and my grandson and her niece went to see Taylor to the tune of \$99 each last summer. She said, "Why Mom, Taylor Swift never went to college!" I did give her an AAUW-WA online membership and she still gets all the emails, so I said, "Well if you get a chance to vote for no college requirement, do so!"

I did enjoy the Grammy's and especially the emcee, Trevor Noah. I read his autobiography some years ago Born a Crime (2016) and so I am amazed at what he has achieved. He grew up in South Africa during apartheid and was raised in Soweto, a segregated part of Johannesburg. His parents were never married because it was against the law for white and Black persons to "mix." His father was Swiss-German White, and his mother was Xhosa Black. He did know his father and they met in unobtrusive spaces, but when they walked together, the father walked ahead of him and his mother so as not to appear connected. His mother was a "go-getter" and made sure that Trevor got an education. His relationships were strained with other kids because he was "colored" and spoke several languages. He did not fit into any group. However, growing up in poverty he became a "huckster" dealing and selling illegal bootleg CDs. He left South Africa for LA as an escape from his mother's abusive husband, who tried to kill her and then threatened him as well. He started his career as a comedian on a dare from his friends. Since then, he has been well known for *The Daily Show* among other things. And, much to my surprise, he is going to be at the Paramount Theatre in Seattle in March. It was reported that Taylor Swift said Trevor did a great job at the Grammy's! One thing that disappointed me at the Grammy's, Trevor did not introduce his mother, although on Stephen Colbert's talk show, he said that she was coming.

We, AAUW-WA, have opportunities to support children and their future when we support Tech Trek campers! During this time of transition, we have three very capable women leaders, Krislyn Davis, Laura Tucker, and Jennifer Danziel who are leading the way. They are working on the budget, the contract with PLU, and with the Tech Trek coordinators as well as getting support from Dorthy McBride, Treasurer of SPF. Susie Johnson, VP for Finance, and I have been working with our insurance broker and with some corrections to the policy have reduced the cost by \$1,000.00. Laura Tucker and I have been corresponding with Shannon Wolfe at the National AAUW Office and have convinced her that we do not need to be a member of the American Camp Association since our staff of educators use current best practices. That decision will also reduce expenses and we thank her for listening to us. Overall, the goal is to reduce the cost of Tech Trek so that it can remain a viable opportunity that we can support. I believe that we can look forward to an excellent Camp experience this summer. I am sure that those who attend will hear stories of former campers, now camp counselors, and their continued education in STEM and their plans. And as my Swiftie bracelet says, "Made with Love."



The Final Step to AAUW Evolution

By now, everyone is aware of the upcoming vote on "Open Up AAUW", the initiative to eliminate the college degree requirement for AAUW membership. What everyone may not know is that this change follows several others throughout AAUW's history, as our mission statement and membership requirements have evolved. AAUW was formed in 1881 and was initially known as the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (ACA). Up until the 1940's, members had to hold approved degrees from a small list of accredited schools. Prospective members had to be voted upon for admission. World War II broadened AAUW' 's perspective, and women from all accredited schools could be admitted. At the AAUW National Convention held in Seattle in 1949, AAUW revised its bylaws to state that the only requirement for membership was a college degree, thereby reaffirming that women college graduates of all races were eligible for membership. Still, it wasn't until 1963 that degrees such as education, nursing, and home economics were approved, and not until 1987 that men were allowed to join. In 2005, nearly 20 years ago now, those with associate or equivalent degrees were permitted membership.

Eliminating the degree requirement in 2024 is the next, and final step, in opening up AAUW membership and truly embodying AAUW's value of inclusion. When AAUW began, women were underrepresented as college students. Over time, women have made great progress and now represent the majority of students on many campuses. Today, we recognize that higher education is one of several paths now available to women. Professional certifications, on-the-job training, career technical experience, and life experience are all alternative paths to obtaining education and skills for women. And, the fights for women's reform – reproductive rights, equal pay, maternity leave, sexual harassment – apply to all women, regardless of the path they choose.

I urge every member to learn more about this initiative and to support it by voting "yes" when the voting period **opens on April 3rd.** The proposed bylaws changes are detailed on the AAUW website at AAUW National Election 2024, where you can also find an Open Membership Toolkit and FAQ. In addition, the Open Up AAUW website contains much information on this change.

#### **Change With the Times**

In our changing world, traditional organizations such as my church and my women's group have been struggling to maintain their membership, as well as their facilities. On my recent trip to Iceland, I was surprised to learn that their government supports their churches with tax money. That support helped explain how they could have so many beautiful churches located even in small towns, all of them seemingly well-maintained. A part of me wished that support was available in the U.S. but as quickly as the idea came into my head, I realized that was not going to happen for many different reasons. For example, in Iceland, the churches are nearly all the same denomination, and most of the population claims to be part of that denomination, although that may change with immigration.

At times, I think that <u>AAUW</u> as an organization has outlived its purpose. It was founded in 1881 as a means of encouraging the small number of women who graduated from college to support one

another, advance in their careers, and work toward greater opportunities for all women and girls. Those goals are still relevant in today's world, but there is much more competition for the use of women's time, so membership numbers decline.

AAUW members are now faced with an important challenge. From the beginning, membership in the organization required a college degree from an accredited institution. There have been many attempts to change that requirement. Currently, both 2-year and 4-year degrees are accepted and there is a special student membership. However, there will soon be a vote on <u>eliminating the degree requirement</u> altogether. In my opinion, it's important for this change to pass. Along with many other institutions around the world, AAUW needs to adapt to the times. As strong advocates for equity for all people, AAUW should not be discriminating against potential members based on their level of education. We need this change to pass so that we can adjust our recruitment and activities to better fit today's world.

#### **Understanding Palliative**

#### and Hospice Care

On Saturday, January 27, Puyallup AAUW members and their guests were treated to an excellent and informative presentation at Puyallup South Hill Branch Library by Laura Castagnoli, RN, BSN (and daughter of member Jo Ingram) on the topic of Hospice and palliative care, their benefits and eligibility. Her program was caring, passionate, and peppered with loads of useful information.

Beginning with the basics and taking questions throughout the program Castagnoli explained, "Wherever the patient lives, we will go and that includes prison, their homes, or if they live in their car," adding that it is important to get a patient on Hospice early.

Castagnoli explained how Hospice holds a memorial service every year for patients who have passed and said Hospice doesn't just serve patients but helps families and caregivers as well. Services continue for up to thirteen months after the patient has passed. 25% of expected deaths occur at home and 85% of Americans prefer to die at home. Family members are encouraged to call Hospice at any time.

Hospice is a hospital and community-based program that began in 1967 by Dame Cicely Saunders, a British registered nurse whose chronic health problem forced her to pursue a career in medical social work. Congress passed a Medicare benefit in 1993.

Castagnoli's presentation held the attention of every person in the room and she `graciously took questions throughout.
